



William Harvey Bell September 8, 1926 -- November 8, 2019

William Harvey Bell, age 93, died Friday, November 8, 2019, in Albuquerque, NM due to complications of pneumonia. Colonel William Bell (often shortened to Colonel, or simply Bill) was born in Atlantic, IA, on Wednesday, September 8, 1926 and graduated from Tarkio High School in Tarkio, MO.

Acquiring a love of flying in his teens, he flew crop dusters and barnstormed a path across the mid-Western countryside in old biplanes. Enlisting in the Army in 1943, he served through WWII, Korea, and Vietnam in the Army, Army Air Corps and, finally, the United States Air Force. For thirty-two years, he served our nation with honor and distinction, rising in rank from Private to Colonel; was wounded twice; and was highly decorated. Always the epitome of a gentleman, everyone loved Bill. He was quick with a joke or a kind word. He formed friendships that lasted a lifetime. Though he did not think of himself as one, he was a true hero.

It was on a visit to New York City on Easter Sunday in 1956, he met the love of his life, Suzanne Shanahan, at the taping of "The Ed Sullivan Show". Married six months later in October, they traveled to Munich, Germany, where he was assigned for duty, and where their three children were born. The family also lived in Niagara Falls and Rochester, NY, Montgomery (Maxwell AFB), AL, then assigned back to Wiesbaden, Germany, where Mrs. Bell accompanied her husband on

many diplomatic tours of Europe while he networked with intelligence personnel of various friendly countries. He was reassigned to Montgomery, AL and, upon his retirement from the Air Force in 1975, the family moved to Riverside, CA.

Family was most important to him and he made countless sacrifices because of his love for them. Bill was a loving husband and hands-on father. Colonel Bell is predeceased by his father, Ray Anderson Bell; his mother, Ina Wolfe Bell; his brother, James Maurice Bell; his loving wife of 56 years, Suzanne Jane Shanahan Bell; his devoted son, William Michael Shanahan Bell; and his grandson, Raymond Garcia.

Surviving are his daughters, Suzanne Kathleen Bell de Garcia of Long Beach, CA, and Kathleen Shanahan Bell of Rio Rancho, NM; his grandson, Alexander Javier Garcia-Bell of Long Beach; his sons-in-law, Javier Garcia of Long Beach and Liam Wolffe of Rio Rancho; his niece, Eva Lynn Wallert of Axtell, KS; and his grandnephew, Dr. Joseph J. Pilsl and his wife, Audrey, of Marysville, KS and their children, Clayton, Carolyn, Brenner and Michael.

His love of family extended not just to his immediate family but his ancestral family as well. He was very proud of his Scottish roots. Because of his decades of research, in 1983, Clan Bell was once again recognized by the Lyon Court in Scotland as a Clan. The Clan tartan was destroyed by the English long ago so Bill (with Bob Martin) designed a tartan for the Clan in early 1984. The tartan is recognized by the Scottish Register of Tartans and registered with the Society of Antiquities of Scotland. For several decades Colonel Bell served as President of Clan Bell International which later became Clan Bell, North America. He was President Emeritus of Clan Bell, North America.

Colonel Bell was invested as a Knight Templar in 1989 in Edinburgh, Scotland. The Knights Templar uphold the ageless ideals of Chivalry and Christian religious commitment and protection, Crusade historical research, and fighting today's enemies of society, namely disease and social distress, through charitable efforts and fundraising. He rose to the rank of Bailiff of the Knights Templar of North America.

The Rules of Acquisition: The Purchase of the Earldom of Wigtown by Archibald Douglas 'the Grim', Lord of Galloway, 1372

A REAL PROPERTY OF A REAL PROPER

The arms of Sir Archibald Douglas 'the Grim', as they appear in the late fourteenth-century Armorial of Gelre. This representation likely predates Archibald's creation as Lord of Galloway in 1369, but shows the ermine field (behind the 'bludy hart' at the centre of his achievement) that Archibald likely adopted as a way to display his status as an illegitimate son of 'the Good' Sir James Douglas. The immense success he enjoyed during his long career led the chronicler Walter Bower to assert that Archibald 'surpassed almost all other Scots of his time in worldly wisdom, resolution and daring [and] in the additions to his inheritance and wealth'. http://journals.socantscot.org/index.php/p sas/article/view/6386 On Oct 7, 1372, at an assembly he himself identified as 'our full council' (*pleno nostro consilio*) in Stirling, King Robert II of Scotland inspected and confirmed a charter concerning the sale of the earldom of Wigtown by Thomas Fleming to Archibald Douglas 'the Grim', lord of Galloway. On the face of it, this may seem like a fairly ordinary land transaction that might be of interest only to a handful of specialists conducting research into landownership practices in fourteenth-century Scotland. In fact, the document offers us a fascinating insight into the ways in which the late King David II had been promoting the interests of his closest familiars in the closing years of his reign, the methods by which Archibald the Grim expanded his authority in the south-west, and how Robert II sought to establish royal authority through negotiation and compromise in the formative years of the Stewart dynasty. Further, the dubious way in which Archibald acquired Wigtown would prove to be a source of tension between the crown and Archibald's successors, and thus the confirmation of 1372 would have ramifications for Black Douglas history well into the fifteenth-century. Today's blog post will therefore consider the document itself, its context, and its consequences.

A Rising Star: The pre-1372 career of Archibald the Grim

Archibald Douglas was born (probably in the 1320s) an illegitimate son of 'the Good' Sir James Douglas, one of the most celebrated heroes of the First War of Scottish Independence. Though his father had become an important courtier and wealthy landowner through diligent service to King Robert I of Scotland, as a bastard Archibald had no right to inherit any of his father's estates or titles. Thus, as a young man, Archibald was forced - like most illegitimate sons in late medieval Europe - to cultivate a reputation for faithful service in the households of his various rich and influential relatives, hoping that through them he might earn a living. Thus in 1334 he accompanied his cousins John and William, at that time the rightful heirs to the Douglas patrimony, to effective exile in France, and in the late 1330s or early 1340s he returned to Scotland in service to a more distant cousin, the warlike <u>Sir William Douglas of Liddesdale (https://drcallumwatson.blogspot.com/2019/07/a-scourge-of-english-and-wall-to-scots.html</u>). We should not perhaps feel too sorry for the young Archibald, since he had clearly inherited his father's intimidating physical presence and propensity for violence, and thus he flourished in the brutal struggles of the Second War of Scottish Independence and Liddesdale's highly-militarised following. Yet also like his father, Archibald was adept at the more subtle aspects of noble life, and he represented the lord of Liddesdale in negotiation as well as warfare. Around 1353, perhaps sooner, Archibald found his way into the service of his cousin William, now

returned from France and from 1357 earl of Douglas. In practical

terms, this can have made little difference to Archibald, who continued to serve as both a fearsome warrior in William's armed following and as a useful servant in diplomatic affairs. Jean Froissart, a traveller and chronicler who met Archibald on a visit to Scotland in 1365, presents Archibald as a giant of a man and was particularly impressed by the size of the sword he wielded, which Froissart believed was so enormous that no other could lift it!

We get a particularly telling insight into Archibald's personality from a tale recounted in the Scotichronicon, a chronicle written in the 1440s by Walter Bower, Abbot of Inchcolm and one of Archibald's contemporaries. In 1356, Archibald accompanied his cousin William on what was supposed to be a pilgrimage to Rome, but which ultimately led them both to the Battle of Poitiers (https://drcallumwatson.blogspot.com/2018/09/theredied-that-daythe-finest-flower-of.html), where they fought for the French army. With the English nearing victory and the French royal host falling apart, Archibald and some more of William's knights fought a desperate rearguard action to give their lord a chance to escape. Their efforts did indeed allow William to make it safely from the battlefield, but Archibald and his comrades were ultimately surrounded and forced to surrender. In the aftermath of the fighting, while the prisoners were corralled together waiting to have their value assessed, Sir William Ramsay of Colluthie - another of the lord of Douglas's retainers - began to shout angrily at Archibald and beat him around the head, drawing the attention of the guards. Ramsay insisted that Archibald was a mere squire, who

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had acquired the expensive armour he was wearing by killing his lord and stealing it. Ramsay paid the guards a small sum of money, commensurate with a squire's ransom, and sent Archibald away to give this fictitious murdered lord a proper burial. Bower sadly offers no indication of the source of this story, and he would have been too young to have heard it from Archibald himself (Bower would have been around fifteen at the time of Archibald's death). However, he was a regular attendee of royal councils and parliaments from the 1420s onwards, and would have had ample opportunity to mix at these events with Archibald's sons and grandsons and to pick up this anecdote from them. While details may have been exaggerated and forgotten in the telling, the combination of physical courage, brazenness and guile resonates strongly with what we can tell of Archibald's outlook from an examination of the rest of his career. This will be crucial to bear in mind when considering the purchase of the earldom of Wigtown below.

There is no particular reason to suppose that Archibald resented his time in service to his more prominent relatives, but when the opportunity to emerge from their shadow he was ready to seize it. This came as a result of the release of King David II from English captivity in 1357. David had struggled to reassert royal authority following a long absence from Scotland between 1334 and 1341, and this aim had not been helped by eleven years as a prisoner in England after 1346. In the late 1350s then, David returned to Scotland fiercely determined to raise the prestige of the Scottish crown and to undermine the influence that the kingdom's leading magnates had built up during his absence. Archibald's cousin William, who had accrued enormous power in southern Scotland through leadership of the fighting men of the marches, was a particular target for the king's suspicion. Although he created the earldom of Douglas for William in early 1358, David remained eager to find ways to dismantle the new earl's stranglehold on authority in the south, and Archibald represented a particularly tempting chance for the king to do so. Though he was illegitimate, Archibald was nonetheless a direct descendent of the renowned Sir James Douglas. Earl William seems to have deliberately fostered an image of himself as James's successor, even adopting the 'bludy hart' of Bruce in his personal heraldry in memory of the sacrifice that his uncle had made in taking King Robert's heart on crusade in 1330. By promoting the interests of James's only living son (bastard or not), David could encourage the earl's followers to view Archibald - not William - as the natural heir to the Black Douglas's legacy. Moreover, by cultivating a personal relationship with Archibald, King David could evoke the friendship between their fathers, another important aspect of the Scots' collective memory of the First War of Scottish Independence. David and Archibald had surely known one

They may also have gotten a chance to renew their acquaintance when Archibald was arrested while on business for his cousin in England in 1357, in retaliation for his cousin's seizure of Hermitage Castle in Liddesdale in defiance of truce negotiations. It is even possible that it was during their shared incarceration that David first conceived of the idea of promoting Archibald as an alternate focus for authority within the wider Douglas affinity, perhaps even floating the idea to Archibald at the time, though this is necessarily speculative.

Whatever the case, in the years following the return of the king Archibald was the recipient of royal patronage. The most ostentatious early example of this was the arranging of his marriage to the wealthy heiress Joanna Murray in 1362. This brought Archibald a swathe of lands in Lanarkshire and in the north-east, elevating Archibald to the status of a significant landowner. When Earl William rebelled against the king the following year - alongside the king's nephew Robert the Steward and Patrick Dunbar, earl of March - Archibald was to be found firmly in King David's camp, and Dr Michael Penman has convincingly suggested that Archibald may have played a key role in inflicting a serious military reversal on the earl at Lanark towards the end of the rebellion. Yet despite this clear move towards being the king's man, Archibald maintained connections with his cousin. When Froissart visited Scotland in 1365 for example, Archibald was to be found at Earl William's castle at Dalkeith while the chronicler was staying there. Once more, Archibald's approach was characterised by its flexibility and was carefully calculated to avoid over-commitment to a single cause or patron. Nonetheless, over the course of the 1360s service to the crown undoubtedly furnished him with the most lucrative rewards. Over the latter part of the decade, Archibald turned his formidable martial skills, honed in the bitter Anglo-Scottish conflict, to enforcing the royal will on Galloway, a troublesome region for successive Bruce administrations due to its former ties to the Balliols. Using the refortified Bothwell Castle - which he had acquired through his marriage to Joanna Murray - as a base, Archibald ruthlessly terrorised the local kindreds of Galloway into submission, driving out many of the local officials and installing his own men in their place. It was due to his ferocity in this endeavour, and the reputation he gained for maintaining royal justice in the region, that Archibald reputedly received his evocative bynames 'the Grim' and 'the Terrible'. As a reward for his diligent service, in 1369 David made

Archibald Lord of Galloway, covering the lands between the River Cree in the west and the River Nith in the east. Though technically not an earldom, the ancient lordship of Galloway gave Archibald a place among the great magnates of the realm, similar in landed wealth - though not in title - with his cousin Earl William. More importantly, at least from King David's perspective, Archibald's acquisition of extensive estates on the west march served as a potent physical counterbalance to Earl William's powerbase in the middle march and the Lothians. This was in a sense a continuation of a policy enacted in the marches by David's father Robert Bruce, who had promoted the interests of Archibald's father in the middle march to offset the power of his brother Edward Bruce in the west (and vice versa).

How the (South-)West was Won: The Purchase of Wigtown

As Warden of the West March from 1364 and Lord of Galloway from 1369, Archibald was undoubtedly the premier magnate in south-west Scotland. His dominance was not complete however, as the lands west of the Cree to the Irish Sea had been given to Malcolm Fleming as the earldom of Wigtown in November 1341. The creation of the earldom of Wigtown had been designed both as a reward for the part Fleming had played in arranging passage for David, Archibald and others to France in 1334 and, perhaps more significantly, to encourage Fleming to pacify the fractious kindreds of western Galloway following the Balliol resurgence that had taken place in the 1330s. Though in general he had been a capable soldier, he seems to have struggled to accomplish this task, not helped by the dislocations of war and a brief period as an English prisoner from 1346-7. His son Thomas had proven to be even less effective in this regard, again not helped by a long enforced absence as a hostage for surety for David II's ransom. David's dissatisfaction with Fleming's performance is suggested by the fact that in 1367 the king revoked his regality rights in the earldom, making Fleming subject to the direct exaction of royal officers again. This was surely intended as a means of exerting greater royal control over the earldom, and may well have been a prelude to transferring it out of Fleming's hands altogether. Certainly, by this point Archibald's pacification of Galloway was well under way, and David may already having

been eying up the possibility of securing the earldom for his ally. This would have the double benefit of giving Archibald control over the total territorial extend of the ancient lordship of Galloway and giving Archibald an aristocratic title that matched Earl William's. However, the method by which Wigtown was eventually passed to Archibald raises some important doubt about this. If David wanted to give Archibald the title 'Earl of Wigtown', why not encourage Fleming to formally resign it and then regrant it to Archibald? Why have Fleming *sell* the earldom, an act with no obvious legal precedent and which surely flew in the face of David's insistence on the crown being the ultimate arbiter of domestic affairs? Instead, it may be that Archibald interpreted his remit to enforce royal authority in the south-west as including wrestling Wigtown from Fleming, who had proven himself unable to exert suitable control over the local kindreds, and the purchase was thus a consequence of Archibald's sharp practice in fulfilling his royally-appointed role. It could even be the case that David deliberately preferred not to give Archibald the aristocratic title 'earl' for fear that he would begin to strain against the restrictions of crown service. Conceivably, Archibald purchasing the earldom represented a compromise between Archibald's ambitions for dominance in the south-west and David's policy of keeping his greatest magnates in check.

What is not in dispute is that on 8th February 1371 Archibald and Fleming were at Edinburgh, where they drew up a charter laying out the essential details of the purchase. That the document was drawn up at Edinburgh may hint at royal involvement, since Edinburgh Castle was David's primary residence throughout his 'second' reign, but we should not perhaps read too much into this as Archibald was so frequently in attendance on the king that this may simply have been a convenient place for the two men to meet and ratify their agreement (Fleming too was no stranger to court life). Following the standard greeting, and a not entirely convincing reassurance from Fleming that he was 'not lead by force or fear', the charter relates how Fleming was motivated to make the sale 'on account of the great and heavy disagreements and other mortal enmities which formerly had arisen between me and the more powerful denizens of the aforesaid earldom'. This amounts to an admission that Fleming had failed to assert effective control over the local kindreds of Wigtown, something that Archibald had proven himself to be eminently capable of east of the Cree. The charter also mentions 'a great, urgent and unavoidable necessity' that put pressure on Fleming to make the deal.

This would seem to refer to serious debts that Fleming had incurred, probably in arranging his release from English custody as a hostage for David II's ransom payments. Here then we find support for the interpretation that David II was behind the deal after all. Conceivably, the king was seeking to find a way to solve Fleming's financial woes

while at the same time securing the whole of Galloway for Archibald, explaining why the king may have arranged the purchase - rather than the resignation - of Wigtown. The charter then identifies the beneficiary as 'the noble and mighty man' (*nobili et potenti viro*) Archibald Douglas, Lord of Galloway, who had purchased the earldom 'for one fixed and notable sum of money'. While the document acknowledges that the payment had been made before the charter was drawn up, it unfortunately does not include a figure to tell us how much the earldom set Archibald back. The charter goes on to relate the specific rights that Fleming was transferring to Archibald, after which it concludes with a list of the witnesses to the

charter's creation. These include how much the earldom set Archibald back. The charter goes on to relate the specific rights that Fleming was transferring to Archibald, after which it concludes with a list of the witnesses to the charter's creation. These include figures local to Edinburgh - such as Walter, Abbot of Holyrood - and also dignitaries from the south-west - including three burgesses from Dumfries - who would have had a direct stake in the settlement of landholding issues in that region. Again, the witness list does not allow us to reach a definitive conclusion about whether this was a wholly private agreement between Archibald and Thomas or whether King David had a hand in arranging matters, since Archibald would have had contact with all of these men through his long career as one of David's courtiers and the recently-appointed Lord of Galloway.

Regardless of whether the king had been involved in bringing the purchase about, the expectation of both sigilants must have been that King David would shortly give the document royal confirmation. Yet they would both be disappointed. On 22nd February 1371, precisely two weeks after the charter had been produced, David collapsed and died at Edinburgh Castle. As he left behind no children of his own, David was succeeded by his nephew Robert the Steward, now King Robert II of Scotland. This was a potentially disastrous turn of events for Archibald. Robert and David had not enjoyed a particularly positive relationship, and although there are signs that by the 1360s David had resigned himself to a Stewart succession he had spent much of his reign trying to thwart his nephew's ambitions for the kingship. As someone deeply and directly associated with the late King David, Archibald cannot have expected to be a particularly appealing figure to the incoming Stewarts. Worse still, Archibald had had more specific unpleasant dealings with the Stewarts in recent years, having feuded with the Steward's younger son Robert, earl of Fife, over the division of the Murray estates on his marriage to Joanna in 1362. David II's patronage helped Archibald secure the settlement he desired, so the Stewart regime might well be expected to harbour particular resentment towards Archibald. Add to this the highly dubious nature of purchasing an earldom in the first place, and the likelihood of this arrangement surviving the transition from Bruce to Stewart Scotland would seem low indeed. However, through a combination of Archibald's existing advantages and Stewart anxieties, the charter seems to have gotten royal confirmation fairly smoothly. Firstly, although he was David's nephew, Robert was some eight years David's senior and already in his late fifties

Stirling Council Record 7 October 1372 (Translated) Charter: ratification of a charter of Thomas Fleming to Sir Archibald Douglas

Robert by the grace of God king of Scots, to all good men, etc. Know that since Sir Archibald de Douglas, our most beloved kinsman, summoned to this end by our mandate and called to our presence, revealed and displayed in our full council held at Stirling, assembled specially in the same place on account of this, a charter of Thomas Fleming, formerly earl of Wigtown, made concerning and upon causing a sale and alienation of the same earldom to the aforementioned Archibald, with other evidences for the right of this Thomas Fleming and the aforementioned Archibald in this regard. We have understood the same charter, having been displayed [and] revealed in this way in the same place by our mandate, and seen, read, inspected and diligently examined by us and our said council, and sealed by the seal of the said Thomas Fleming, neither cancelled, damaged, erased nor destroyed, and not distrusted in any of its parts, but free of fault and suspicion entirely, word for word under this form.

To all who [see or read] this charter, etc., Thomas Fleming, earl of Wigtown, eternal greeting in the Lord. Know that I, not lead by force or fear nor by an erroneous lapse, but brought about by my pure and spontaneous desire in a great, urgent and unavoidable necessity, and especially on account of the great and heavy disagreements and other mortal enmities which formerly had arisen between me and the more powerful denizens of the aforesaid earldom, have sold and granted in perpetuity by title of sale to the noble and mighty man Sir Archibald de Douglas, lord of Galloway, from the east side of the River Cree, all my abovesaid earldom of Wigtown with the pertinents, and have transferred purely, simply, absolutely and in perpetuity all right and claim that is applicable or may be applicable in any way in the future to me, my heirs or assignees in the said earldom with the pertinents, onto the aforementioned Archibald for one fixed and notable sum of money paid to me in my aforesaid great and urgent necessity by hand, concerning which sum I acknowledge has been well and fully paid to me. To be held and had by the aforementioned Archibald, his heirs and his assignees in fee and heritage, by all its rightful boundaries and divisions, in meadows, grazing-lands and pastures, muirs, marshes, ways, footpaths, rivers, ponds, mills, multures, with bonds and bondages and their inhabitants, hawking-places, hunting-grounds and fisheries, and with patronages of churches, with gallows and pit, soke and sac, toll and theame, infangthief and outfangthief, with fees and forfeitures and escheats, with wards, reliefs and marriages, with the tenancies and services of freeholders, also with all and singular other liberties, profits, easements, lawful pertinents [and] free customs pertaining to the said earldom or which may pertain in any way, by whatever title or law, as freely and quietly, fully, honourably and integrally in and by all ways as I, the aforesaid Thomas, as freely, quietly, fully, integrally and honourably held or possessed the said earldom of Wigtown, or any of my predecessors held or possessed the said earldom. In testimony of which matter my seal is appended to the present [letters]. Given at Edinburgh on 8 February A.D. 1371. With these witnesses, Walter, by the grace of God abbot of Holywood, William Monypenny, parson of the church of Cambuslang, Neil de Cunningham, Thomas de Raith, Nicholas Smerles, burgesses of Dumfries, and many others.

Which very charter, displayed and revealed in this way to us, we ratify, approve and confirm for ourselves and our heirs in perpetuity in all points, conditions articles and circumstances, in equal form and effect in all ways, saving our service. In testimony of which matter we have ordered our seal to be appended to our present charter of confirmation. Witnesses, etc. At Stirling, on 7 October in the second year of our reign [1372].



when he became king. Indeed, that David seems to have reconciled himself to a Stewart succession later in life may have been predicated on the expectation that at least it would not be Robert himself who acceded to the throne. Though he would turn out to have nearly twenty years left in him, in 1371 Robert must have harboured concerns that he might not have long to consolidate his rule. He thus sought to do so through compromise - rather than conflict - with David's familiars, seeking to reassure them that Stewart power would not jeopardise their interests. Archibald in particular was a figure that Robert II could not afford to alienate so early in the reign. We have already explored Archibald's reputation

as a fearsome and experienced war leader, and thanks to David II's patronage he was a major landowner with a formidable armed following drawn from both north and south of the Forth-Clyde isthmus. In the circumstances, Archibald was more useful to Robert II as an ally than an opponent. The confirmation of the charter of 1372 is thus a striking example of King Robert's conciliatory policy towards former adherents of David II in practice. Royal authority was maintained throughout. Archibald was required to present himself at Stirling and submit to having the charter inspected in council. From Archibald's perspective, this can hardly have seemed too irksome. After all, service to the crown had been the most lucrative source of advancement in his career thus far and he therefore had every reason to wish to present himself as much as a faithful Stewart subject as he had been a Bruce loyalist. With Archibald having paid due deference to the crown, the confirmation of the charter seems to have been a mere formality, with king and council providing reassure that 'we ratify, approve and confirm for ourselves and our heirs in perpetuity in all points, conditions articles and circumstances, in equal form and effect in all ways, saving our service'. In Archibald the Grim and Robert II we have two of the most shrewd and capable political actors in late medieval Scotland, and their interactions in 1372 only reinforce that impression.

Grim Consequences: The Legacy of 1372

Although neither the text of the charter nor the record of the council at Stirling make this explicit, part of the compromise between Archibald and Robert may have included the stipulation that the purchase of Wigtown related to the *lands* of the earldom, but not the title 'Earl of Wigtown'. Certainly, at no stage does Archibald appear to have used that style. This would have been a reasonable way of getting around the questionable legality of buying an earldom, and frankly the land suited Archibald better

than the title anyway. Archibald did eventually acquire an aristocratic title in 1389, when he exploited the crisis caused by the death of James, 2nd earl of Douglas, at the Battle of Otterburn to make a successful claim on the earldom of Douglas. This made Archibald one of the most powerful figures in the kingdom both in terms of land, affinity and title, a position that he continued to consolidate and expand right up to his death in 1400. His son Archibald, 4th earl of Douglas, expanded the family's interests even further, looking to significantly extend the fame of the Black Douglases beyond Scotland as well as entrenching their domestic dominance. He was helped in this by the fact that from 1406-1424 King James I of Scotland (Robert II's grandson) was a prisoner in England, removing the risk of royal interference in his ambitions. The earldom of Wigtown featured prominently in the fourth earl's efforts to raise the family's prestige. At some point between 1417 and 1419, probably in anticipation of the Scottish military expedition to France in the latter year, the fourth earl's son and heir - yet another Archibald (https://drcallumwatson.blogspot.com/2018/06/sirarchibald-duke-of-touraine-death-of.html)- began using the title 'earl of Wigtown'. The use of a courtesy title to identify an individual as the heir to a particular possession was a common practice, with 'Master of' being the most frequently used style in Scotland, but the assignation of an actual earldom (even if it was still treated merely as a courtesy title) to an heir was more commonly associated with princely figures. For instance, the earldom of Carrick had been used to denote the heir to the entire kingdom of Scotland for much of the fourteenth-century (arguably the earliest example of this was the granting of the title to Edward Bruce by King Robert I in 1313). That this was the impression that the fourth earl hoped to evoke is perhaps reflected by the observation of the contemporary English writer John Shirley that during James I's captivity 'therlle Douglas both governe and reule alle on this side the Scottische see [i.e. the River Forth]'. We should be cautious not to read unscrupulous or insubordinate motives into the fourth earl's behaviour concerning the earldom of Wigtown. Like his father, and indeed his successors, Archibald, 4th earl of Douglas, probably understood himself as the King of Scots' premier servant and saw adherence to the crown as his best means of maintaining and expanding his domestic position. But he also had an eye on increasing his international renown, and he was willing to exploit his technical possession of two earldoms to achieve this.

Following the return of James I to Scotland in 1424, coupled with the <u>death of the fourth earl</u> (<u>https://drcallumwatson.blogspot.com/2018/08/a-second-agincourt-battle-of-verneuil.html</u>) soon afterwards, the Black Douglases found themselves drawn into a lengthy struggle to maintain their authority in the face of crown hostility. Like the struggle itself, the role that the earldom of Wigtown played in this struggle was subtle at first. Shortly before his death, the fourth earl had assigned his wife Margaret Stewart (James's eldest sister) to administer the lordship of Galloway, apparently including the lands associated with the earldom of Wigtown. In 1426, King James ratified a life grant of the lordship to Margaret, seemingly to temporarily alienate these symbolically significant estates from the Black Douglas patrimony. This generated some tension between Margaret and her son Archibald, 5th earl of Douglas, who competed with his mother to exert influence over the lordship in order to emphasise the point that Galloway would still revert to him when she died. In 1426 for instance, disagreement broke out over the appointment of the keeper of Lochnaw Castle, the former *caput* (administrative centre) of the earldom of Wigtown, resulting in a meeting between the earl and his mother at Threave at which they

Clearly, the fifth earl still felt that Wigtown (and Galloway as a whole) rightfully belonged to him, and was willing to push the limits of royal tolerance in order to assert those rights. When he died in 1439, the fifth earl even had both the earldom of Wigtown and the lordship of Galloway included among the long list of titles inscribed on his ornate tomb at St Bride's Kirk in Lanarkshire, despite the fact that Margaret remained in possession of them at this time.

From the death of James I in 1437 until the end of the minority of James II in 1449, crown-Black Douglas tensions subsided. However, internal family politics provided more than enough drama in the meantime. In 1440, in the midst of the frantic politicking of the minority, the fifth earl's sons were 'judicially murdered' at the so-called 'Black Dinner' and the Black Douglas patrimony was delivered into the hands of James 'the Gross', the fourth earl's younger brother who had likely facilitated this grim affair. The life grant of the lordship of Galloway made by James I meant that Galloway (and Wigtown) remained in Margaret's hands, but in 1444 James the Gross's son William, 8th earl of Douglas, married Margaret's granddaughter and namesake Margaret (the fifth earl's daughter and only surviving child) and by 1447 he reunited Margaret's holdings to the rest of the Black Douglas estates. When James II's minority ended in 1449, it at first appeared that relations between the crown and his most powerful magnate would remain cordial, but the young king would prove to be the Black Douglases' nemesis in the coming years. Issues surrounding the rightful possession of the earldom of Wigtown would prove to be a central issue in the early stages of the conflict between the king and the Black Douglas earls. This almost certainly stemmed from the dubious nature of Archibald the Grim's acquisition of the earldom in the first place, and the sharp practice by which the eighth earl had regained control of it in the 1440s. These facts, combined with a general sense of unease among the wider Black Douglas affinity over how the 'new' Black Douglases had risen to prominence in light of the Black Dinner, made Wigtown a relatively easy target for royal interference. When an attempt at détente between the king and the eighth earl was made in 1451 - after the first round of open hostility had ended in something of an embarrassing climbdown on James's part - the earldom of Wigtown was specifically withheld from the earl, although it was eventually regranted. Even following the re-grant, James II's queen Mary of Gueldres retained specific rights within Wigtown and James continued to interfere in the management of the earldom until his final overthrow of Black Douglas power in 1455. Thus over

the course of the late fourteenth- and early fifteenth-centuries, possession of the earldom of Wigtown developed from a major benefit for the founder of the Black Douglas magnate dynasty to one of the family's greatest liabilities. The purchase of 1372 was undoubtedly one of the great successes of Archibald the Grim's long and successful career, but in the charged political atmosphere of the 1450s, with the Scottish crown eager to assert its dominance by breaking up 'old fashioned' magnate power blocks, it provided his successor's royal opponent with a pretext for their destruction.

West-Virginia Regent Brathann Rule





The Douglases of Drumlanrig,

Queensberry and Kelhead.

THE pedigree of this family is based on that given in Douglas' *Peerage*, Maxwell's History, Complete Peerage, Nisbet's Heraldic Plates, Musgrave's Obituary, and Burke's Peerage, other authorities are mentioned in the text.

- (21) SIR WILLIAM DOUGLAS OF DRUMLANRIG was the natural son of James, second Earl of Douglas and Mar (No. 9), and his father gave him the barony of Drumlanrig. He was knighted before 1405. In 1421 was present at battle of Beaugé, and was probably killed there. He married Elizabeth, daughter of Sir Robert Stewart of Durisdeer. Their son :-
- (22) WILLIAM DOUGLAS, died 1458. Married Jane, daughter of Sir Herbert Maxwell of Caerlaverock, and had :---
- (23) WILLIAM DOUGLAS, who married Margaret, daughter of Sir William Carlyle of Torthorwald. He died 1464, leaving :-
- (24) SIR WILLIAM DOUGLAS, died 22nd July 1484, leaving four sons :--


- (25) JAMES DOUGLAS, married in 1470 Janet, daughter of Sir David Scott of Branxholm, and died 1498, leaving :----
- (26) SIR WILLIAM DOUGLAS, married Elizabeth, daughter of Sir John Gordon of Lochinvar, and died at Flodden 1513. He had two sons :-(a) James (No. 27).

(b) Robert (No. 63).

- (27) SIR JAMES DOUGLAS, knighted 1550; died 1578; married first Margaret, daughter of George, Master of Angus (No. 119), but divorced her before 1540, when he married second Christian, sister of second Earl of Eglinton.
 - Erms on Seal, 1537.—I and 4. Three stars. 2 and 3. A heart, on a chief three crosses potent (Laing). Arms on Seal, 1545.—1 and 4. A heart, on a chief three stars. 2 and 3. Five cross crosslets fitchy in saltire (Laing).
 - The Arms shown in Sir David Lindsay's MS., 1542, are—1 and 4. Argent, a heart crowned gules, on a chief azure three stars of the first. 2 and 3. Azure, a bend between six cross crosslets fitchy or; all within a bordure engrailed gules. [Plate III., fig. 2.]

(30) SIR WILLIAM DOUGLAS OF DRUMLANRIG. Born 1582; died 8th March 1640; created LORD DOUGLAS OF HAWICK AND TIBBERIS, 1st April 1628, and on same day VISCOUNT OF DRUMLANRIG, Lord Douglas of Hawick and Tibberis. On 13th June 1633 he was created EARL OF QUEENSBERRY, Viscount of Drumlanrig, Lord Douglas of Hawick and Tibberis. He married before 1617 Isabel, fourth daughter of Mark Kerr, first Earl of Lothian; she died 1628. They had :-

- (31) JAMES, SECOND EARL OF QUEENSBERRY, died 5th August 1671. He married first, August 1630, Mary, third daughter of James, second Marquis of Hamilton, who died s.p. 29th October 1633. He married secondly, about 1637, Margaret, eldest daughter of John, first Earl of Traquair, and had :--
 - (a) William (No. 32).
 - (b) James Douglas, Lieutenant-General in Army, died Namur 1691.
 - (c) John Douglas, killed at siege of Trevers 1673.
 - (d) Robert Douglas, killed at siege of Maestricht 1676.
- (32) WILLIAM, THIRD EARL OF QUEENSBERRY, born January 1637; died 28th March 1695. On 11th February 1682 he was created MARQUIS OF QUEENSBERRY, Earl of Drumlanrig and Sanquhar, Viscount of Nith, Torthorwald and Ross, Lord Douglas of Kinmont, Middlebie and Dornock. On 3rd November 1684 he was created DUKE OF QUEENS-BERRY, Marquis of Dumfriesshire, Earl of Drumlanrig and Sanquhar, Viscount of Nith, Torthorwald and Ross, Lord Douglas of Kinmont, Middlebie and Dornock. He married in December 1657 Isabel, daughter of William Douglas, first Marquis of Douglas (No. 141), and had :---

 - (a) James (No. 33).
 (b) William, Earl of March (No. 35).
 - (c) George Douglas, died unmarried 1693.

(d) Anne Douglas, married David, Earl of Wemyss, and had issue.

- Erms recorded in Lyon Office.—I and 4. Argent, a king's heart crowned gules, on a chief azure three mullets of the first. 2 and 3. Azure, a bend between six cross crosslets fitchy or; all within a bordure engrailed gules. [Plate III., fig. 2.] When he was created Marquis in 1682 the bordure was changed to-Or charged with a double tressure flory-counter-flory gules [Plate III., fig. 3.] CREST: A heart gules, winged and crowned with an imperial crown or. MOTTO: "Forward." SUPPORTERS: Two Pegasi argent, winged or.
- (33) JAMES, SECOND DUKE OF QUEENSBERRY, born 18th September 1662; died 6th July 1711. He was the first Scotchman to join the Prince of Orange, and greatly helped the Union of Scotland and England. Created Knight of the Garter 1701. On 26th May 1708 he was created DUKE OF DOVER, Marquis of Beverley and Baron Ripon. On 1st December 1685 he married Mary Boyle, second daughter of Charles, Lord Clifford of Lanesborough. She died 2nd October 1709. In 1706 he obtained a regrant of some of his titles, the effect of which will be found below. They had the following children :---
 - (a) William Douglas, born and died 1696.
 - (b) James Douglas, "the cannibalistic idiot" who roasted a

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kitchen boy about 1707, when left alone with him in Queensberry House, Edinburgh. Born 2nd November 1697; died unmarried, and was buried 17th February 1715. (He was *de jure* third Marquis of Queensberry).

(c) Charles (No. 34).

- (d) George Douglas of Drumcrief, born 20th February 1701, died unmarried, 14th February 1725.
- (e) Jean Douglas, married Francis Scott, second Duke of Buccleuch.
- (34) CHARLES, THIRD DUKE OF QUEENSBERRY, born 24th November 1698; died 22nd October 1778. In his father's lifetime he was created on 17th June 1707 EARL OF SOLWAY, Viscount of Tibberis, Lord Douglas of Lockerby, Dalveen and Thornhill. On 10th March 1720 he married Catherine Hyde, second daughter of Henry, fourth Earl of Clarendon. She died 17th July 1777. They had :--
 - (a) Henry Douglas, born 30th October 1722; killed by accidental explosion of a pistol in his father's lifetime, 19th October 1754. He married, 24th July 1754, Elizabeth Hope, daughter of John, second Earl of Hopetoun. She died without issue 7th April 1756.
 - (b) Charles Douglas, born 17th July 1726; died unmarried in his father's lifetime, 24th October 1756.

On the death of the third Duke of Queensberry the titles conferred on his father in 1708, and the titles conferred on himself in 1707, became extinct. The other titles devolved as under :—

Second and third Grand Quarters: Gules, a lion rampant within a bordure argent, charged with eight roses of the first. CREST: A heart gules, winged and crowned with an imperial crown or. SUPPORTERS: Dexter, A pegasus argent winged or; Sinister, A lion argent. MOTTO: "Forward." [Plate III., fig. 4.]
- (36) WILLIAM, SECOND EARL OF MARCH, born about 1696; died 7th March 1731. He married Anne Hamilton, eldest daughter of John, Earl of Ruglen. (See No. 169). They had :--
- (37) WILLIAM, THIRD EARL OF MARCH, born 16th December 1725; died unmarried 23rd December 1810. On the death of his mother, 21st April 1748, he succeeded her as EARL OF RUGLEN, Viscount of Riccartoun and Lord Hillhouse. In 1778 he succeeded his cousin (No. 34) as FOURTH DUKE OF QUEENSBERRY. On 21st August 1786 he was created LORD DOUGLAS OF AMESBURY. He was known as "Old Q." On his

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death the Barony of Douglas of Amesbury, the Earldom of Ruglen, Viscounty of Riccartoun and Barony of Hillhouse became extinct. The Dukedom of Queensberry, Marquisate of Dumfriesshire, Earldoms of Drumlanrig and Sanquhar, Viscounties of Nith, Torthorwald and Ross, Baronies of Douglas of Kinmont, Middlebie and Dornock devolved on Henry, third Duke of Buccleuch. (See No. 33 e). The Earldom of March, Viscounty of Peebles, Baronies of Douglas of Neidpath, Lyne and Munard devolved on the Earl of Wemyss. (See No. 32 d). The Marquisate and Earldom of Queensberry, Viscounty of Drumlanrig, Baronies of Douglas of Hawick and Tibberis devolved on his heir-male Douglas of Kelhead. (See No. 43, and below).

- (38) SIR WILLIAM DOUGLAS OF KELHEAD, second son of first Earl of Queensberry (see No. 30), died 1673. He married, first, Agnes, daughter of George Fawside of Fawside; secondly, Jean Stuart of the Traquair family. By his first wife he had :--
 - (a) William Douglas.
 - (b) James (No. 39).(c) Robert Douglas.
 - Erms recorded in Lyon Office 1672-77; patent dated 1668.-1 and 4. Argent, a man's heart proper crowned gules, on a chief azure three mullets of the first. 2 and 3. Azure, a bend between six cross crosslets fitchy or; all within a bordure engrailed gules, charged with eight bezants. (In 1772 these Arms were matriculated without the bordure.) CREST: A man's heart proper powdered with bezants, and crowned and winged or. MOTTO: "Forward!" [Plate III., fig. 5.]
- (39) JAMES DOUGLAS, born 19th February 1639; died about 1707. On 26th February 1668 he was created a BARONET. He married, about 1667, Catherine, second daughter of James, second Earl of Queensberry (No. 31), and had an only son :--
- (40) SIR WILLIAM DOUGLAS, SECOND BARONET, born about 1675; died 10th October 1733. He married, about 1705, Helen, daughter of Colonel John Erskine, who died 26th July 1754, leaving :-
 - (a) John (No. 41).
 - (b) William Douglas, died unmarried 1786.
 - (c) Charles Douglas of Breconwhat, married Mrs Young; died without issue 13th December 1770.
 - (d) James Douglas, M.D., married a daughter of Sir Patrick Maxwell, Bart.; had two sons, who died unmarried.
 - (e) Archibald Douglas, died unmarried.
 - (f) Stewart Douglas, died unmarried 30th June 1795.
 - (g) Erskine Douglas, died 10th February 1791. Married Eleanor, widow of Thomas Witter, and had :-
 - (I) William Erskine, born 1766; died 1771.
 - (h) Francis Edward Douglas, married Mrs Hunter; died without issue 21st June 1793, aged seventy.
 - (i) David. (See No. 54).
 - (j) Thomas Douglas, died unmarried 1744.
- (41) SIR JOHN DOUGLAS, THIRD BARONET, born about 1708; died 13th November 1778. He married, about 1730, Christian, sixth daughter of Sir Wm. Cunningham, Bt., of Caprington. She died November 1741, leaving :-

- (43) SIR CHARLES DOUGLAS, FIFTH BARONET, born March 1777; died 3rd December 1837. He succeeded his kinsman (see No. 37) as sixth Marquis of Queensberry in 1810, as the Marquisate and Earldom of Queensberry, Viscounty of Drumlanrig, and Barony of Hawick and Tibberis were not included in the regrant of 1706. (See Nos. 33 and 37 above). On 7th June 1833 he was created BARON SOLWAY OF KINMOUNT. He married, 13th August 1803, Caroline Scott, third daughter of Henry, third Duke of Buccleuch. She died 29th April 1854. As the Marquis left no male issue, the peerage conferred on him became extinct, but the other titles devolved on his brother.
- (44) JOHN, SEVENTH MARQUIS OF QUEENSBERRY, born 1779; died 19th December 1856. He married, 16th July 1817, his cousin, Sarah, daughter of James Sholto Douglas (No. 51). She died 13th November 1864, leaving an only son :--
- (45) ARCHIBALD, EIGHTH MARQUIS OF QUEENSBERRY, born 18th April 1818. He died, from an accidental explosion of his gun, 6th August 1858. He married, 28th May 1840, Caroline, younger daughter of Sir William Robert Clayton, Bt. They had :---

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(53) REAR-ADMIRAL STAIR DOUGLAS, third son of No. 50, born 1764; died 1826. Married, 1802, Anne, daughter of John Payne, and had :-(a) Rev. Stair Douglas, born 1804; died 1874. Married, 1831,

Maria, daughter of Woodbine Parish.

- (a) Colonel William Douglas, died 1834. Married, first, 1795, Catherine, daughter of William Johnston of Lockerby, and had :-
 - (I) David Wm. Archibald, died 1841. Married, 1833, Mlle. Suzan.

Colonel Douglas married, secondly, his cousin, Wilhelmina Douglas.

(b) Admiral John Erskine Douglas, died 1847. Married, 1818, widow of Major White and daughter of John Griffith.

(c) Dunbar Hamilton Douglas, died unmarried.

Dornock.

HIS pedigree founded on that given in Ramage's Drumlanrig Castle and the Douglases ; other authorities mentioned in text.

(55) ARCHIBALD DOUGLAS, third son of William, first Earl of Queensberry (No. 30), received the estate of Dornock, Dumfriesshire, from his father. His Will recorded 11th September 1679 (Dumfries). He had two sons :--

- (a) William (No. 56).
- (b) Major Archibald Douglas. Will recorded January 1710 (Dumfries).
- (56) WILLIAM DOUGLAS OF DORNOCK. Wills recorded 25th May 1717, 29th March 1736, and 22nd February 1750 (Dumfries). He married Alison Pennycook. Will recorded January 1698 (Dumfries). His son :---
- (57) JAMES DOUGLAS OF DORNOCK married Isabella Man (Drumlanrig and the Douglases), and had three sons :--

 - (a) James (No. 58).(b) John Douglas. Will recorded 13th September 1717 (Dumfries).
 - (c) William Douglas of Bodisbeck, who apparently died s.p., as his brother James was retoured his heir, 21st September 1736.
- (58) JAMES DOUGLAS OF DORNOCK married Philadelphia, daughter of Sir John Johnstone, first Baronet of Westerhall, and had :-
- (59) ARCHIBALD DOUGLAS, retoured heir to his uncle, William Douglas of Bodisbeck, 10th April 1760. He apparently died s.p., as his sisters succeeded. Dornock, sold to the Duke of Queensberry in 1707 (Drumlanrig and the Douglases).

Mouswald.

(60) SIR JAMES DOUGLAS second son of Sir James Douglas of Drumlanrig (No. 29), and brother of first Earl of Queensberry, obtained Mouswald from his

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father, 7th and 8th October 1608. In 1615 he married Helena, eldest daughter of Sir William Grierson of Lag. His son :---

(61) JAMES DOUGLAS OF MOUSWALD, M.P., 1644-47, married in 1627 Agnes Rome, and had :--

- (62) JAMES DOUGLAS OF MOUSWALD, married, 1654, Janet, daughter of Laurie of Maxwellton, and died in his father's lifetime, s.p.
 - The above from "The Barony of Mouswald and its Barons," by John J. Reid, B.A., F.S.A.Scot. (Proceedings of the Society of Antiquaries of Scotland, 1888-89).

Lincluden.

(63) ROBERT DOUGLAS, second son of Sir William Douglas of Drumlanrig (No. 26). About 1547 he became Provost of Lincluden. In 1560 he persuaded the prebendars to assign the estates of the college to him, and lived on one of the estates—Greenlaw. His Will, dated 12th September 1609, is given in the Buccleuch MSS. Report. In it he mentions his grandson, John Douglas.

Etims on Seal 1569.—1 and 4. A heart, on a chief three stars. 2 and 3. A bend between six cross crosslets fitchy (Macdonald).

Cashogle.

THIS pedigree compiled from official records and other sources mentioned in the text.

- (64) ARCHIBALD DOUGLAS OF CASHOGLE, second son of No. 24, is mentioned in the *Exchequer Roll* 1482. He married Isabel Pringle, who afterwards married Carnel Wallace and is said to have borne twelve sons to each husband (Douglas' *Baronage* and Ramage's *Drumlanrig Castle*). He was killed in battle 22nd July 1484 (Ramage). His eldest son :--
- (65) ARCHIBALD DOUGLAS OF CASHOGLE is mentioned in the Great Seal Register, 1532-45. His son :--
- (66) SIR WILLIAM DOUGLAS OF CASHOGLE, and as son of Archibald, was contracted to marry Janet, daughter of Sir James Douglas of Drumlanrig, 1538 (Buccleuch MSS. Report). They had issue :--
 - (a) James Douglas and his father had seizin, 1545, of lands of Kirkbride.
 - (b) Robert (No. 67). (c) Archibald (No. 69).

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- (67) SIR ROBERT DOUGLAS OF CASHOGLE was retoured heir to his brother James 1594, and is mentioned in the *Privy Council Register*, 1574-1616. He married Nicola Johnston, and her Will was recorded Edinburgh 1590. They had three sons :--
 - (a) William (No. 68).
 - (b) Robert Douglas, mentioned 1609 (Privy Council Register). He lost his left ear in a brawl 1621. (Pitcairn's Trials).
 - (c) John Douglas, mentioned 1609 (Privy Council Register).
- (68) SIR WILLIAM DOUGLAS OF CASHOGLE. As apparent of Cashogle he is mentioned in the *Privy Council Register*, 1609-19, and as Sir William about 1620 and on to 1634. In *Traquair MSS. Report* he is mentioned 1637. He married Grizel Moray of Blackbarony about 1625 (Douglas' *Baronage*).
- (69) ARCHIBALD DOUGLAS, as brother of Sir Robert (No. 67), is mentioned 1582 (*Privy Council Register*). He married Barbara Napier, who was tried for witchcraft 1591 (Pitcairn). They had a son :--
- (70) JOHN DOUGLAS, who with his father had seizin of lands in Durisdeer, 1569, and he had also seizin of Vicarland, 1612 (Ramage's *Drumlanrig Castle*). His great-grandson:—
- (71) JAMES DOUGLAS got seizin of some lands from the Duke of Queensberry 1714, and is there referred to as great-grandson of John (Ramage's *Drumlanrig Castle*).

Penzerie and Baitford.

(72) GEORGE DOUGLAS, third son of No. 24, is said to be ancestor of Douglas of Penzerie (*Douglas Peerage*), but the Douglases of Penzerie and Baitford are so hopelessly mixed in the records that it is impossible to separate them, if they need separating, for the similarity of names and dates suggests only one family. I shall take first :--

- (5) WILLIAM DOUGLAS OF PENZERIE, "a deboshed man," 1608-16 (Privy Council Register). Letters of remission to, 1626 (Great Seal Register).
 - WILLIAM DOUGLAS OF PENZERIE, retoured to his father James 16th July 1672 and 7th January 1686.
 - ISABELLA and MARY, retoured heirs-portioners of James Douglas of Penzerie, their father, and William Douglas, their brother, 14th July 1693.

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Baitford.

- (1) DAVID DOUGLAS OF BAITFORD, 1573 (Buccleuch MSS. Report).
- (2) ARCHIBALD DOUGLAS, brother of James Douglas of Baitford, 1609 (Buccleuch MSS. Report).
- (3) JAMES DOUGLAS OF BAITFORD, retoured to his father David, 4th October 1575, mentioned Great Seal Register, 1594; Privy Council Register, 1602; Buccleuch MSS. Report, 1609.

ROBERT, brother of James Douglas of Baitford, 1609 (Buccleuch MSS. Report).

- (5) WILLIAM DOUGLAS OF BAITFORD, 1603 (*Privy Council Register*), retoured heir of his father James, 19th January 1628. As William Douglas of Greenlaw and Lyncluden, son of James of Baitford, he is mentioned 1610-14 (*Privy Council Register*), and as William Douglas of Baitford, 1617-27 (*Privy Council Register*).
 - ALEXANDER DOUGLAS OF BOITFOORD, Will recorded Dumfries, 6th October 1680.
 - ROBERT DOUGLAS OF BAITFORD, retoured to his father, Alexander, 1667. His Will recorded July 1704, Dumfries.

Note.—The stumbling-block of the whole pedigree has been No. 5, William Douglas, who is said at different times to be of Baitford and of Penzerie. He is also said to be grand-nephew and also son of Robert Douglas of Lincluden (No. 63), whom he succeeded in part of his properties, notably Greenlaw. He was a thorough scoundrel, and was eventually tried for theft and other crimes in 1610, and sentenced to have his right hand struck off, and then to be hanged. In Pitcairn's *Trials* he is called "William Douglas of Lyncluden and Grenelaw (callit Williame of Pinzerie), eldest sone and appeirand air of *William* Douglas of Baitfurd." The father's Christian name is evidently a mistake. Sir Herbert Maxwell in his *House of Douglas* assumes that William was executed, but the letters of remission granted to him, 1626, would show that William escaped the gallows. 


The Douglases of Cavers.

THE pedigree of this family is based on that given in Wilson's Hawick and its Old Memories, and privately printed pedigrees of the Douglases of Friarshaw, and now of Springwood Park. Other authorities mentioned in the text.

- (78) ARCHIBALD DOUGLAS OF CAVERS, called "Black Archibald," was the natural son of James, second Earl of Douglas and Mar (No. 9). He was granted the estate of Cavers, with the heritable sheriffship of Teviotdale, by his aunt, Lady Isobel Douglas, Countess of Mar, in 1404. He married Margaret ——, and died about 1435. He was succeeded by his son :—
- (79) WILLIAM DOUGLAS OF CAVERS, who died 8th January 1464. His son :---
- (80) SIR ARCHIBALD DOUGLAS OF CAVERS, died in 1486.
 - **Etrms** on Seal, 1466.—1 and 4. A heart, on a chief three stars. 2 and 3. A bend between six cross crosslets fitchy (Laing). He left a son :—
- (81) SIR WILLIAM DOUGLAS OF CAVERS, died 26th October 1506. He is mentioned, with his late father, 1494 (*Exchequer Rolls*). He left two sons :--
 - (a) William Douglas, probably died in his father's lifetime.
 - (b) James (No. 82).
- - (a) Sir James (No. 83).
 - (b) William Douglas of Friarshaw, security for his brother James in 1545 (Acts of Parliament). (See No. 97.)
 - (c) Robert Douglas, married Helen, daughter and heiress of Douglas of Todhoillis or Todalia, and had a son :---
 - (1) James of Todhoillis, living 1584 (Acts of Parliament).

Erms on Seal, 1512.—A heart, on a chief three stars (Laing).

- (83) SIR JAMES DOUGLAS, served heir to his father 27th October 1545. Married Christian, daughter of Andrew Ker of Fernihurst, and died July 1558, leaving three sons :---
 - (a) William (No. 84).
 - (b) James Douglas.
 - (c) Robert Douglas, brother of William, 1585 (Acts of Parliament).
- (84) SIR WILLIAM DOUGLAS OF CAVERS, mentioned in Privy Council Register, 1561-89. Married Euphemia Ker, daughter of Sir Wm. Ker of Cessford, and had two sons :--
 - (a) James (No. 85).
 - (b) Thomas Douglas, brother of James, 1605 (Privy Council Register).



(85) SIR JAMES DOUGLAS, died 1612, had a charter under the Great Seal, 1576. He married, first, contract, 1st June 1580, Margaret, daughter of Sir John Cranston of that Ilk (*Scots Peerage*), and had a son :—

(a) Sir William (No. 86).

He married, secondly, a daughter of Sir James M'Gill, and had by her :----(b) Rev. James Douglas, M.A., minister of Cavers, 1647-58

(Scott's Fasti).

(c) Thomas Douglas, Bailie of Edinburgh. (See No. 429).

(86) SIR WILLIAM DOUGLAS, died about 1658. He married Ann, daughter of Douglas of Whittinghame, and had two sons :---

(a) Sir Archibald (No. 87).

- (b) John, ancestor of Douglas of Garvald. He purchased the lands of Garvald from James Douglas (No. 276 d), brother of Sir Archibald of Whittinghame, 1631 (Great Seal Register). In Stodart's MS. are Lewis Douglas of Garvald and a son, William of Garvald, 1686-1704.
- (87) SIR ARCHIBALD DOUGLAS, died about 1669. He married Rachel, daughter of Sir James Skene of Halyards, President of the Court of Session, and had one son :---
- (88) SIR WILLIAM DOUGLAS, died December 1676. He married Katharine, daughter of Thomas Rigg of Athernie. She was known as "the Good Lady Cavers," and was imprisoned for about two years in the covenanting times. They had five sons :--
 - (a) Sir William (No. 89).(b) Archibald (No. 90).

(d) James Douglas.

- (e) Thomas (No. 91).
- (c) John Douglas.
- **Etrms** recorded in Lyon Office, 1672-77.—Argent, a man's heart proper, on a chief azure three mullets of the first, a bordure of the third. CREST: A dexter hand holding aloft a broken spear. MOTTO: "Do or die." [Plate III., fig. 7.] In later times the heart is crowned. In Henry Fraser's (Ross Herald, 1687-1724) "Funeral Escutcheons" the heart is shown at different times crowned and plain; the bordure is sometimes azure, and in others gules. Stacie and Sir Patrick Home show the bordure or, and describe the Arms as "Cavers of old." [Plate III., fig. 8.] Porteous (Snowdon Herald, 1661) gives quite different Arms—Argent, a tree growing out of a mount in base proper, on a chief gules a heart between two stars argent. [Plate III., fig. 9.] An MS. which belonged to Sir Robert Sibbald also shows these Arms, but with the chief azure.
- (89) SIR WILLIAM DOUGLAS, died February 1698 without issue; served heir to his father 1687. He married, about 1690, Elizabeth, daughter of John Douglas of Newcastle. He was succeeded by his brother:--
- (90) ARCHIBALD DOUGLAS, died 1741; served heir to his brother 1698. He was Receiver-General and Post-Master General of Scotland, and M.P. for Roxburghshire. He married Anna, daughter of Francis Scott of Gorrenberry, and was succeeded in Cavers by his four sons in succession :—
 - (a) William Douglas, M.P. for Roxburghshire, died unmarried in January 1748.
 - (b) Archibald Douglas, died January 1774. He was the last heritable Sheriff of Teviotdale, as heritable jurisdictions were abolished by Act of Parliament. He married Elizabeth, daughter of Hugh Scott of Gala, but had no issue.

THE DOUGLASES OF CAVERS

- (c) Rev. James Douglas, D.D., Prebendary of Durham Cathedral, died 1780. He was served heir to Archibald Douglas of Cunziertoun 28th September 1736. He married Jean, daughter of Halyburton of Pitcur, but had no issue.
- (d) Captain John Douglas, R.N., of Edderton, died 30th May 1786. He married Ann, daughter of Hugh Scott of Gala, but had no issue.
- (91) THOMAS DOUGLAS, fifth son of No. 88, born May 1677, after his father's death. He married Jean Pringle of Haining, and had one son :---
- (92) ANDREW DOUGLAS, Paymaster in the Navy. He married Miss Mercer, and had :---/37 (b) Archibald (No. 95).

- (93) GEORGE DOUGLAS, died 1815. He succeeded to Cavers, and married Grace Stuart, daughter of Francis, Earl of Moray, and had a son :---
- (94) JAMES DOUGLAS, died 17th August 1861. He married Emma, daughter of Sir David Carnegie, Bt., of Pitarron, and had a son and daughter :-
 - (a) James Douglas of Cavers, died without issue 29th July 1878.
 - He married Mary Graham, daughter of Sir Andrew
 - Agnew, Bart., 23rd June 1858, who died 13th July 1885. (b) Mary Douglas, married, 1857, Wm. Elphinstone Malcolm of Burnfoot, and died 1859, leaving a daughter :---
 - (1) Mary Douglas of Cavers, who married, 1879, Captain Edward Palmer, Rifle Brigade, who
 - took the name of Douglas.
- (95) ARCHIBALD DOUGLAS, second son of No. 92, died 1825. He succeeded to Edderton, Midshiels, etc., on the death of his kinsman, Captain John Douglas (No. 90 d). He married Jane Gale of Arkleby, Cumberland, and had a son :--
- (96) ARCHIBALD PRINGLE DOUGLAS, who married Margaret Violet, daughter of Mark Pringle of Haining, and had issue.

Friarshaw.

- (97) WILLIAM DOUGLAS OF FRIARSHAW, second son of No. 82, died 1575. He married Euphame Davidson, who died February 1578. They had issue :--
 - (a) John Douglas of Friarshaw, died without issue before 1603.
 - (b) James Douglas. He is supposed to have died unmarried before 1603, as his brother George then had the estate of Friarshaw.
 - (c) George (No. 98).
 - (d) Andrew Douglas. He married Marion Douglas, and is mentioned in a charter 1581. He had one son :--(1) George Douglas, living 1600.
 - (e) William Douglas, had son :-) Named as brothers and (I) Robert Douglas. nephew of George, 1617 (f) Robert Douglas. (Privy Council Register).
- (98) GEORGE DOUGLAS OF FRIARSHAW, died about 1623. He married, first, about

1576, Margaret, daughter of Hugh Myddelmist in Midlem; and, second, in 1615, Agnes, daughter of John Douglas, Provost of Haddington. He

is mentioned, with his second wife and son, in *Privy Council Register*, 1619. The son was:—

(99) ANDREW DOUGLAS OF FRIARSHAW, died about 1644, leaving two sons :-

(a) Andrew (No. 100).

(b) William (No. 111).

(100) ANDREW DOUGLAS OF FRIARSHAW, married, 1640, Jean Hume of Polwarth, and had two sons :---

> (a) Thomas Douglas, M.D., married a daughter of the Lord Mayor of London, and died in Dublin without issue 1686.

(b) Henry (No. 101).

(101) HENRY DOUGLAS OF FRIARSHAW, died March 1701. He married, 13th April 1672, Martha, only child of Samuel Lockhart of Castlehill, brother of "Lee," and had issue :—

(a) George (No. 102).

- (b) James Douglas, baptised Edinburgh 23rd July 1674; died 27th April 1757. He was a merchant in London, and married a lady named Russell. They had a son :—
 - James Douglas, died 2nd June 1751. He was M.P. for Malmesbury, and married Albinia, daughter of Major-General Wm. Farrington of Chiselhurst, and widow of Robert, first Duke of Ancaster. She died 29th July 1745.
- (c) Thomas Douglas, baptised Edinburgh 11th November 1676;
 died 1730. He was a colonel in the army.
- (d) Henry Douglas, baptised Edinburgh 16th May 1679; died young.
- (e) Samuel Douglas, baptised Edinburgh 13th July 1682.
- (f) Henry Douglas, baptised Edinburgh 1st April 1684; died
 1753. He was a planter in Antigua, and married Mary
 —, and left a daughter.
- (g) Andrew Douglas, died in India 1732.
- (h) William Douglas, died 1741. He was Commander of H.M.S. Falmouth.
- (102) GEORGE DOUGLAS OF FRIARSHAW, baptised Edinburgh 2nd May 1673; died 6th October 1753. He was an Advocate, and married, 27th April 1702, Elizabeth, daughter of Sir Patrick Scott, Bt., of Ancrum. They had issue:—
 - (a) Henry Douglas of Friarshaw, born 1703; died 4th November 1778. He was served heir to his father 16th August 1754. He left a daughter.
 - (b) James (No 103).
 - (c) Peter Douglas, born 1714; died 1735.
 - (d) Andrew Douglas, born 1725; died 1772. Married, 20th June 1750, Christian, daughter of James Cheape of Rossie, and left two daughters.
 - (e) Robert (No. 108).

Étrms recorded Lyon Office, 1747.—Argent, a man's heart gules, ensigned with an imperial crown proper, on a chief azure three mullets of the first; all within a bordure nebuly of the fourth. CREST: A hand grasping a broken spear proper. MOTTO: "Do or die." [Plate III., fig. 10.]

(103) SIR JAMES DOUGLAS, BART. He was born 1704, and died 2nd November 1787. He was an Admiral, and was created a Baronet 27th June 1786. He acquired, in 1750, Brigend, near Kelso, which formed part of the lands of Maxwell, and changed the name to Springwood Park. He married, first, 1753, Helen, daughter of Thomas Brisbane of Brisbane, who died 20th March 1766. He married, second, 1768, Helen Boyle, daughter of John, Earl of Glasgow. By his first wife he had issue :--

(a) George (No. 104).

- (b) James Douglas, born 23rd June 1755; died 1840. He was an Admiral, and married, first, November 1793, Elizabeth, daughter of Captain Robert Scott, R.N., and had a son :-
 - (1) James Douglas, died unmarried in India 2nd May 1819.
 - He married, second, 1st June 1820, Frances, daughter of William Scott of Great Barr.
- (c) Thomas Douglas, born 18th November 1756; died Bengal 1784. He left a natural daughter, Mary.
- (d) Henry Douglas, born 27th October 1758. He was a Judge at Patna. He died unmarried 18th November 1839.
- (104) SIR GEORGE DOUGLAS, SECOND BARONET, born 28th February 1754; died

(105) SIR JOHN JAMES SCOTT-DOUGLAS, THIRD BARONET, born 19th July 1792; died 23rd January 1836. He was an officer in the 15th Hussars. He married, 15th August 1822, Hannah Charlotte, daughter and heiress of Henry Scott of Belford, Roxburgh, and assumed the name and Arms of Scott. His widow married William Scott Ker of Chatto. They had a son :---

(a) George (No. 106).

Erms recorded in Herald's College, 17th August 1822.-1 and 4. Douglas of Friarshaw as above. 2 and 3. Or, on a bend azure a star of six points between two crescents of the field, in chief a sword in pale proper, and in dexter chief a canton ermine (Scott). CRESTS: Dexter, Douglas as above; Sinister, a lion's head erased, holding in its mouth a thistle, all proper (Scott). MOTTOES: Dexter, Douglas as above; Sinister, "Pro patria" (Scott). [Plate III., fig. 11.]

(106) SIR GEORGE HENRY SCOTT-DOUGLAS, FOURTH BARONET, born 19th June 1825; died June 1885. He married, 1st November 1851, Maria, daughter of Don Francisco Sanchez Serrano de Pina, of Gibraltar, and had issue :--

- (a) James Henry Scott-Douglas, born 27th May, 1853; killed
 - in Zululand 3rd July 1879.
 - (b) George (No. 107).
 - (c) Francis John Scott-Douglas, born 27th November 1858; married 2nd September 1891, Fanny, daughter of Sir George Meyrick, Bt., and had :--

(109) ARCHIBALD DOUGLAS, born September 1759; died 1812. He was a Lieutenant-Colonel. In 1785 he married Anna, daughter of Salonthay van Salontha, Lord of Kessel, and had :--

- (112) HENRY DOUGLAS, in Midlem called "Old Henry," 1680. In 1665 designated as in Nether Priestoun, and after 1687 as "of Priestoun." He had two sons :---

 - (b) George Douglas of Burlands, Crofts, etc., in Midlem, living 1697.

(113) WILLIAM DOUGLAS OF NETHER PRIESTOUN. He married first in 1691 Mary, daughter of Simon Haliday of Selkirk, and had :---

The individuals selected will be awarded a plaque at a Scottish festival near to them.

Active Member Meritorious Service Award

Active Member Meritorious Service Award nominations are solicited annually from the general membership, Regents and Board of Directors via email and articles in the newsletter. Nominees must be an active (dues current) member of CDSNA; any active member is eligible.

Dr. Gilbert Douglas, Jr. Award

The Dr. Gilbert Douglas, Jr. Award is intended to be offered on an occasional basis to individuals who have served Clan Douglas for many years in an exemplary manner. The Board of Directors nominates and approves recipients of this award. <u>Nominees must have served 10 or more years in either an elected or appointed position with Clan Douglas.</u>

Robert W. Groves, Jr. Award

The Robert W. Groves, Jr. Award is intended to be offered on an occasional basis to individuals who have served Clan Douglas for many years in an exemplary manner. The Board of Directors nominates and approves recipients of this award. **Nominees must have served 15 or more years in either an elected or appointed position with Clan Douglas.**

Service Awards Nomination Committee

The President will appoint a chairperson and 2 members to the Awards Committee to serve a period of time determined by the President. The Awards Committee will be responsible for soliciting nominees through emails and an article in the *Dubh Ghlase*.
