PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Since our Newsletter in June, the CDAA members in Brisbane have had some interesting activities to share with our interstate and overseas members. The 19th Annual Bannockburn dinner was hosted on Saturday 23/Jun/2007 by Clan Campbell and I was proud and happy to represent Clan Douglas there. It was a night to remember our Scottish Heritage with reference to Scotland's greatest victory over the

English at the Battle of Bannockburn in 1314. King Robert the Bruce led his army of 13,000 to bravely defeat the English King Edward II and his army of 40,000. (Our kinsman, Sir James Douglas also featured heroically in this famous battle). Detailed information is to be found with Google on the internet.

I have asked Mary Smith to print "The Flower of Scotland", the Scottish National Anthem which refers specifically to this battle and how the Scots sent 'proud England's army homeward — to think again'.

The next day, Sunday 24/Jun/2007, the Scottish Clans congress of Queensland held the Kirkin' the Tartan Ceremony at St Patrick's Catholic Church, Fortitude Valley. Eleven of our Clan Douglas members attended this historic ceremony and our new Douglas Banner was borne for the first time. Maddy Douglas held our banner high in the procession of Clans' banners led by a Scottish piper.

Later that day, more members and friends gathered for a 20th Anniversary lunch and my welcome address will also be included in this newsletter.

An interesting new member Dr Beryl Turner from Gladstone attended the lunch and as project administrator for Clan Douglas of North America, Dr Turner spoke about the Douglas DNA Project she is involved in. It already has participants such as the Earl of Morton, the Queensberry/Drumlanrig and the MacKenzie-Douglas lines and the organisers are currently looking for descendants of the Earls of Angus, the Red Douglas branch. When Dr Turner managed to track down the Australian Clan Douglas Association, I was able to tell her that my own family are descended from the first Douglas Earl of Angus, George 1380-1403. The aim of the project is to establish a data base of the various Douglas branches so that eventually, Douglas families will be able to distinguish from which branch of the family they are descended through DNA. SANDILANDS, LORD TORPHICHEN (Continued)

Sir James Sandilands of Calder was the eldest son of John and Margaret Sandilands nee Bartoun. James was denounced a rebel when he was charged of involvement with many others (March 1565-66) concerning the murder of David Riccio. He attended the Convention held in Edinburgh 14/Feb/1569-70, being the day of the Regent Moray's funeral. In July 1573, James Sandilands of Calder issued a warning to Captain Diones Pentland who had raised 300 soldiers for service in the Low Countries, that he should observe certain conditions or face a huge fine. Sir James Sandilands died intestate at Edinburgh 17/Feb/1576-77 leaving a very young family. He had married Jean Ross daughter of James, 4th Lord Ross and by her had

2. Elizabeth Sandilands to whom James, Lord Ross, was appointed tutor -dative by the King 17/Jul/1578 and who was married to John Mowbray, son of John Mowbrav of Barnbougle.

1. James Sandilands of Calder second Lord Torphichen of the name of Sandilands, was born about 1574 and succeeded to the peerage on the death of his great uncle in 1579. He only seems to have had 2 tutors — Harry Stewart of Craigiehall and latterly Sir James Sandilands of Slamannan until 1588-89 when James chose curators, next of kin on his father's side being Mr John Cockburn of Ormiston, George Dundas of Dundas and James Sandilands of Slamannan and on his mother's side Robert, Lord Ross, and James Ross of Wardlaw. He was retoured heir of James, Lord Torphichen brother-german of his grandfather in the barony of Torphichen 12/May/1597 and from that date to 1605, his name appears often in documents relating to the Hospitallers' possessions being retained by the family in that district. James Sandilands, Lord Torphichen, died August 1617. He married (1) Elizabeth, daughter of James Heriot of Trabroun by Isabella Maitland his wife, to whom the Mains of Calder and the lands of Camilty were confirmed 16/Feb/1600. He married (2) Mary, eldest daughter of Gilbert, 7th Lord Somerville. She married (2) William Douglas of Pumpherston and died 15/May/1620. By Elizabeth Heriot only, Lord Torphichen had issue.

Two years later, he received a peremptory order from the Privy Council to produce a list of all the fencible persons in the parish of Calder. In 1629, Lord Torphichen was charged to apprehend all Jesuits and all other persons found going on pilgrimages to chapels and wells. John died in July 1637. He married Isabel, daughter of Sir Walter Dundas of Dundas by whom he had issue

DOUGLAS MOTORCYCLES

Far away from the Birmingham and Coventry foundry centre of the Midlands of the United Kingdom, this Bristol-based Douglas Company became famous for the manufacture of machines powered by a horizontally-opposed twin cyclinder engine.

Two brothers William and Edward Douglas both foundrymen of Scottish descent, settled in Bristol in 1882 and it was not long before they became noted for their quality castings in Kingswood where they had established their workshop. A man named Joseph Barter who had pioneered the horizontally-opposed twin cylinder engine, aroused William Douglas' interest and he decided to engage Joseph to design and help build motocycles under the Douglas name after Barter's business went into liquidation. They commenced manufacture of the motorcycles in 1907 but it was not long before Edward Douglas left the business and went into the manufacture of boots and shoes.

A win in the 1912 Junior TT competition brought the company to the attention of the War Office and made the name 'Douglas' symbolic with its two-speed gearbox motorcycles and paved the way for the firm to supply in large numbers, motor cycles for the armed forces during World War 1. Further wins in 1923 Senior and the Sidecar TT races ensured the consolidation of a thriving business that carried the company successfully through the Great Depression of the late 1920s. The company was fortunate in getting a Royal endorsement of their product when Prince Albert (later King George VI) and Prince Henry became enthusiastic Douglas owners. The Spanish Monarchy also acquired motorcycles. During the early 1930s, the company experienced a series of financial crises after which William Douglas relinquished his interest. However, William was eventually forced to buy back the company in order to safeguard its survival. Unfortunately not even he could save it. Following the early deaths of two of his sons, William himself died in 1937 at the age of 78. With the outbreak of the Second World War and no sign of contracts for motorcycle machines, the company opted for deployment and went into the manufacture of munitions and similar war work. A fresh start seemed assured in 1946 with some promising new designs but this was not to be. Always under capitalised and following the appointment of an Official Receiver, it remained an uphill struggle until in 1956 the Westinghouse Brake and Signal Company acquired the premises. In less than two years all production of motocycles ceased - the area was required for other purposes.

The Douglas name lingered on with the importation of Gilera motocycles in a range of Vespa scooters and mopeds from Italy, by the Douglas Company from their office at the Fishponds Trading Estate near Bristol. The Douglas company's death knell was sounded when Vespa (UK) Ltd., acquired the Company in 1982. It had enjoyed a run of some 50 years and acquired a following that is still very much in evidence today. Douglas enthusiasts everywhere feel very proud of their association with this famous company that is still regarded with such pride and affection in the Bristol area.

The centenary of the Douglas Motorcycles was celebrated in 2007 with the opening of the new Douglas Gallery at the Kingswood Heritage Museum near Bristol. A special Douglas Cavalcade of vintage motorcycles was held along the old factory test route. Despite the disappearance of the Douglas name from the racing circuit, old Douglas enthusiasts still appreciate the massive role the motorcycle played in its heyday.

Douglas yDNA Project

A most exciting development in modern genealogy has reached the Douglas family! Now we can examine some of the mythologies surrounding our heritage and at the same time find our links to the old Douglas family. The Douglas (Duglis, Douglass, and other surname variants) family has been well documented and goes back to Willem de Duglis (c1174). Willem is thought to have been a Viking and perhaps the son of Theobald the Flemming. There are various theories as to his connections, based on similarities in the crest and tartan with other Scots clans.

There have been a number of distinct lines within the Douglas family, such as the Black, the Red, and the Morton Lines. And there are many other groupings, such as the Hamilton-Douglases, the Queensberry line, the McKenzie-Douglases, the Douglases of Glenbervie and the list goes on. For modern Douglas families, particularly where emigration has taken them a world away from Scotland, the connections to the old lines have often been lost. Many Douglases do not know where they fit into the Douglas family. We often have oral history linking us to a particular branch or person, but until now, no way of proving that connection.

The Douglas Surname yDNA Project can provide the means of re-establishing our connections between males of the Douglas family and allows us to focus our research into appropriate branches of the tree to find our ancestors. Each line of the family will have distinct yDNA characteristics and modern Douglases can compare their own test results with the results of those known to be of a particular line.

The project is still in its infancy, but already, we have yDNA samples from the Morton line and the Queensberry line. We also have a Mckenzie-Douglas participant whose results are expected soon. Modern Douglas families are joining the project in the hope of finding where they match with the old lines. Some of these can immediately see that they should direct their research into one line or abandon another.

We are hoping to find more participants, perhaps from the Clan Douglas Society who can trace their lineage back to Willem (1174) and who will join the study. In particular, we currently need someone who is descended from the Earls of Angus (Red Douglases), or someone from the Earls of Hamilton line. We have members who think they might be related and are awaiting a known (by conventional genealogy) descendant to compare results. We would also like to hear from any Douglas with Gordon connections.

And, with enough participants, we may eventually be able to say with confidence whether or not Willem (1174) was a Viking and even whether his father was Theobald the Flemming.
